St Mark's is a scholarly Christian theological community that has been serving Australian society and the church since 1957. It is Anglican in foundation and ecumenical in ethos, biblically based, and centrally orthodox in theological outlook.

We pursue a mission which, in the words of our founder, Bishop Ernest Burgmann (1885–1967), is to engage the people of God with Australian society.

We fulfill our mission through our undergraduate and postgraduate courses in theology, ministry, pastoral counselling, and professional supervision.

We prepare lay leaders, deacons, and priests from for a variety of situations and ministries through courses in higher education and in non-accredited training. Our courses in the higher education provision (HEP) sector are offered through our partnership with Charles Sturt University.

St Mark's also has a historic commitment to 'public theology'—the business of showing how Christian theology helps people of all faiths and none in our common life. Our leading theological journal, *St Mark's Review*, continues to do that after nearly 70 years of publication.

Our partnership with the School of Theology at Charles Sturt University puts us at the heart of a vibrant public university, whose mission to rural and regional Australia, to vocational excellence, and to the public good, strongly coincides with our own. At the same time, regular daily prayer and Bible reading in the Anglican tradition keeps us attentive to a life together in Christ.

Faith in Christ is here to stay.

Even though the pandemic years and their sense of crisis have receded into the past, shocks and difficulties continue to assail us—wars rage overseas and divisions persist within our common life. In such times it is easy to go inward, hunker down, cut ourselves off. And then, it becomes hard to reengage with others. That kind of post-pandemic ‘overhang’ affects each of us personally. It also affects churches, workplaces and communities as they try to rebuild. I have found that reconnecting with God, and with others, has been the most stabilising way to reintegrate after the years we’ve had. Learning at St Mark’s can be part of that, and has

helped many people during the past few years. The help has been both ‘everyday’ and profound.

Every day our rhythms of learning at St Mark’s have been an anchor: our livestreamed chapel services, lectures, and tutorials bring together on-campus and online students; our library support is delivered to your door if needed; close personal support from faculty reaches into homes across Australia and beyond—it adds up to become community. More profoundly, to delve deeply into Christian traditions that reveal and discover who we are meant to be—the person God ‘dreams’ for us to be, if I can put it like that—revolutionizes



our lives. St Mark's has been a national leader in theological distance and online education longer than any other theological college in Australia. That strength has come into its own, with the aid of Charles Sturt's fantastic infrastructure. Our partnership with Charles Sturt University also means our high-quality tertiary theological education is probably Australia's most affordable (with FEE-HELP eligibility, fee-free MPhil and PhD courses, and BTh fees around 30 per cent less than our nearest theological college). It's also probably the most flexible (online or on-campus, hybrid, full-time or part-time).

When we engage by these means, we learn about times and places where people had it tough. We hear of Christians enduring the callousness of ancient Rome, or the pains of medieval Europe, or recent colonial excess; they made it, because they learnt from Christ's endurance of his Cross, and what it was like to have the Spirit. Our learning gives a kind of perspective that enables us to transcend the anxieties of our present day.

For anyone who wants in to Christian faith, there comes hope. We take all comers at St Mark's. You may be a convinced Christian or an agnostic seeker. You may be a highly motivated

member of a Christian denomination, someone wanting 'tools' for ministry of some kind (whether lay or ordained), someone who just wants to deepen faith and understanding in their relationship with God, or someone who put faith aside years ago and is cautiously looking at it all again. You may just be someone with an interest in the beliefs, practices, and influence of the world's largest and most dynamic religion. You may be none of the above. But whoever you are, hope is on offer, because the Christian story does not stop in the past. It reaches into the present and the future, way beyond our cultural moment. It offers a new present start now, whoever we have become. Christ offers a way to become that person God has created us to be—someone stabilized and confirmed within God's all-embracing love and kindness, and in a community of others who are learning to care. We would love to share that story with you, in an environment that is 'centrally orthodox,' biblically based, practical, missional, ecumenically collaborative, and scholarly.

INTERESTED IN MINISTRY?

FORMATION PROGRAM FOR ANGLICAN MINISTRY

St Mark's began as a library. Not long after, it became a place to prepare for ordained ministry within the Anglican Church of Australia.

We now also prepare lay leaders (and followers) to be useful in their churches and communities. Often those people start discerning a call to ministry as deacons or priests—whether to become chaplains in the community, or to serve in and lead an Anglican church.

St Mark's therefore assists applicants for ordination within the Anglican Diocese of Canberra and Goulburn. Once accepted as an applicant by the bishop of the Diocese, we invite you into a two-year program of formation.

Some applicants for ordination complete theological study, also required by the bishop, in parallel with the formation program. Others have already completed a degree in theological learning. (The bishop has specific requirements for your theological learning, which you should check with us before choosing electives. People who already have a theological degree may need to do some further learning.) While theological learning entails fees, the formation program is free of charge.

We accept all comers into our CSU courses, but the formation program is different. You can only enter it if the bishop has indicated provisional openness to ordain you. (The bishop will require you to demonstrate an active Christian

faith; involvement in ministry as a lay person; a recommendation from a pastor; and no impediment after psychological assessment and some other checks.)

We regard formation as a time for personal stretching and change, to ensure you become even more 'fit for purpose' for ministry. There is some reading and preparation for monthly meetings, and some training in the specifics of Anglican ministry. The program is 'unaccredited', meaning that no degree or award arises from it. Trainers in the program will share with you their views on your readiness for ministry, and will also convey those views to the bishop. Formation can be a taxing time, but it is also a good time, and St Mark's trainers aim to be on your side in it.

For further information, it is best to call St Mark's and ask for advice on ordination. We will explain to you the bishop's tertiary educational requirements, and details about the formation program. We can also put you in touch with the bishop's delegate, who explains and guides the process of becoming an applicant for ordination.

Also, join our email list and keep your eye out for Ordination Enquiry Days, each a joint venture of St Mark's and the Diocese, held once or twice yearly.

For over twenty-five years St Mark's has been a partner in the School of Theology at Charles Sturt University, and collaborates with United Theological College (UTC) in the operation of the School. Ming Hua Theological College (MHTC) also participates in the School. St Mark's offers a range of undergraduate and postgraduate courses in theology, ministry, and pastoral counselling. St Mark's, UTC, and MHTC each teach their cohorts according to their needs.

The School of Theology has an established reputation for its emphasis on student learning, quality teaching, and research. Online delivery of subjects is offered within the School from the Canberra campus of St Mark's, and by its faculty.

Research seminars for postgraduate students include many from around Australia.

Our member colleges have their bases in the Anglican and Uniting Church denominations. However, the ethos of the School is ecumenical, with staff drawn from a variety of Christian traditions. All are committed to deliver a faithful, comprehensive, rigorous, and vibrant theological education. We respect each learner's starting point in their journey, helping them to see how other views from within the Christian tradition (and beyond) may inform their own.

Research is highly valued in the School, which is committed to fostering a scholarly theological community that engages with contemporary society. This commitment is reflected in our postgraduate research program and in the close association between the School and its Canberra campus neighbour, the Australian Centre for Christianity and Culture (ACC&C), and the ACC&C's CSU-based research centre, the Centre for Religion, Ethics and Society (CRES).

FUNDING YOUR STUDY

HECS-HELP LOAN

HECS-HELP is a loan which allows you to defer paying fees until you are earning a salary. If you are eligible for and are offered a Commonwealth supported place, the majority of your tuition fees will be subsidised and you will only be required to pay a portion of the total amount, which can be deferred through HECS-HELP.

A HECS-HELP loan can cover all or part of your student contribution amount, and you repay it through the taxation system once you are earning a certain salary.

FEE-HELP LOAN

FEE-HELP is a loan scheme that assists eligible fee-paying students pay all or part of their tuition fees. It cannot be used for additional study costs such as accommodation or text books. The total amount of FEE-HELP a person can use is known as the 'FEE-HELP limit'.

CREDIT FOR PRIOR LEARNING

When you apply to study at Charles Sturt University, you may be eligible to receive credit based on Recognition of Prior Learning for your previous study and/or work experience.

Recognition of Prior Learning (RPL) is an assessment process that involves assessment of an individual's relevant prior learning (including formal, informal and non-formal learning) to determine the credit outcomes of an individual application for credit. Your application for credit, including full documentation of your prior learning, will need to be submitted together with your application for admission to a course.

OVERSEAS STUDY OPPORTUNITIES

As a School of Theology student, you have the opportunity to include an overseas study experience as part of your degree. It's a great way for you to see the world and build a competitive edge, while gaining credit towards your studies.

Through CSU Global, you could study on exchange, participate in short-term study programs, attend conferences, volunteer, or undertake workplace learning at one of the many international destinations in our network.

St Mark's regularly offers study tours as an optional part of the curriculum. Students are able to claim credit for an 8-point subject (THL361 or THL427) for their participation in these tour.

The most recent tours include:

- a three-week study tour through the Holy Land with the first week spent doing biblical archaeological fieldwork in Bethsaida, followed by a tour of biblical and archaeological sites in Israel and Jordan
- a two-week study tour of Germany, Switzerland, Italy and France, exploring the history of the Renaissance and the European Reformations.

Generous travel grants, loans, and scholarships are available, from \$500 to \$7,300, to help you undertake these amazing international educational experiences. This is a truly memorable, hands-on way of grappling with source material during your theological journey with us.

ONLINE & DISTANCE LEARNING

STUDY WHERE YOU ARE

St Mark's is your 'one stop shop' for in-depth pastoral and theological learning from the comfort of your own home or local café.

But the first question we often get is: **'How often do I have to come to Canberra?'**

The short answer is: it's flexible. You're welcome to come often, and we can work with you if you can't. We have students in every corner of Australia and beyond who vary in their ability to join us in person, and we work with anyone, anywhere.

THEOLOGY DEGREES ONLINE

Learning about God includes learning in relationships, through community. In our huge country, that's quite hard. Through our partnership with Charles Sturt University, St Mark's specialises in building and maintaining a strong and supportive connection with students in Australia and beyond.

- Each subject has a 'live' lecturer, not an absent pre-taped person. Our faculty is experienced and qualified in their area. You won't be referred to a less qualified 'tutor'.
- Classes are usually live-streamed so you can engage in real-time. You can access recordings of classes later, too.
- Charles Sturt's online learning platforms, Interact2 and Brightspace, give clear guidance, e-readings, teachers' notes, and more.
- Online forums give you access to other students to converse with. Our learners are from several Christian

denominations (or none); you'll meet interesting people in a collegial and respectful environment.

- You can learn with others face to face at regular two-to-four day intensives in Canberra. But we don't want to break your budget, so these are often optional.
- The full range of Charles Sturt University's magnificent library network, including its massive collection of ebooks and ejournals, is accessible online. We also post books from our theological library, one of the largest in the southern hemisphere, with reply-paid return.
- Some undergraduate courses are Commonwealth Government supported, meaning you pay far less than for comparable Australian degrees in theology (for example, our fees for the Bachelor of Theology are around one-third less than our nearest Anglican theological college).
- Some of our postgraduate courses (MPhil and PhD) are now fee-free for the normal duration of your course. You can undertake them online or in person.

In other words, we offer deep online learning in theology. We want you to know God more, with others, in the company of educators and trainers who will guide you well.

BACHELOR OF THEOLOGY

The Bachelor of Theology offers a thorough grounding in the four foundational areas of theology: Biblical Studies, Systematic Theology, Practical Theology, and Church History.

The course has a strong basis in Biblical Studies and Systematic Theology, but students have opportunities to pursue a significant number of subjects in any of the four main areas. Although undertaken with the rigour of university studies, there is a strong commitment to a balance integrating of theory and practice.

SUBJECTS

The Bachelor of Theology comprises 24 subjects, beginning with core subjects that introduce the four discipline areas, a biblical language subject and an indigenous studies subject. Higher-level subjects give more focus and deeper analysis in the discipline areas. It is possible to add up to four subjects from a non-theology discipline to this degree structure. Provided required core subjects are covered, students in this degree program may exit early either with an Associate Degree in Theology (16 subjects) or a Diploma of Theology (8 subjects).



GRADUATE CERTIFICATE IN THEOLOGICAL STUDIES

(4 Subjects)

The Graduate Certificate in Theological Studies offers an admission pathway into theological study for students with an undergraduate degree from a different discipline. It provides an introduction to Christian theology, Old Testament studies, New Testament studies, and church history.

The course provides a foundational component of training for ministry in the church and offers students the opportunity to deepen their understanding of the Bible and theology. You can complete this Graduate Certificate in one year by studying four subjects part-time online, or break up your study over more semesters. This course also articulates into the Master of Arts (Theological Studies).

Charles Sturt University offers three different Master-level theological courses that cater to different academic pathways and vocations.

MASTER OF ARTS (THEOLOGICAL STUDIES)

COURSEWORK

If you have an undergraduate degree in another discipline and are new to theological study, this Masters will give you a broad and solid foundation in theology. The course can be completed in 18 months full-time and integrates with practical experience to equip you for Christian ministry and leadership. MASTER OF THEOLOGY

GRADUATE CERTIFICATE IN PROFESSIONAL SUPERVISION (PASTORAL) (4 Subjects)

This course gives ministry workers, educators, and other mid-career professionals the opportunity to study the theory and practice of professional supervision for pastoral contexts. It integrates best practice in the sector within a theological and client-centred framework.

It is intended to train people to work as Professional Pastoral Supervisors of:

- Clergy, church workers, and pastoral carers.
- Chaplains and Pastoral care workers in hospitals, the aged care sector, prisons, and schools.
- Ministry and other students in training.
- Other professionals seeking pastoral supervision including education, youth, community, and health sector workers.

This course will also allow individuals to qualify for membership of professional supervision associations.

This course emphasises face-to-face practical sessions for role play and simulated supervision experiences, and group sharing and discussion as a form of assessment. Learners are also required to include 10 hours of practice as a supervisor and 8 hours as a supervisee. Additionally, 100 hours of work placement must be logged.

ADMISSION

There are two pathways into the course:

- successful completion of an undergraduate degree in either Theology, Social Work, Psychology, Education, Management or equivalent; **or**
- have at least five years professional experience within a helping profession and a recommendation from an employer, professional association, or ordaining body.

SUBJECTS

Skills and knowledge in this course are taught using a highly integrated approach.

The course comprises four subjects worth 8 credit points each (total 32 points).

MIN503 Professional Supervision 1

This subject introduces students to the key aspects of professional supervision. The students will learn advanced skills and knowledge in a range of areas, including how to establish and manage a supervision relationship, how to facilitate transformational learning for a supervisee, how to provide professional supervision in a range of contexts, how to distinguish professional supervision from other forms of reflective practice, how to undertake professional and theological reflection, and how to apply legal and ethical responsibilities within professional and ministry contexts (involves workplace learning and an intensive school).

MIN525 Professional Supervision 2

This subject introduces students to the key aspects of professional supervision in pastoral contexts. The students will learn advanced skills and knowledge in a range of areas, including how to establish and manage a supervision relationship; how to provide professional supervision in ministry, community sector, and professional contexts; how to undertake professional reflection; how to plan group interventions; how to provide ethical and pastoral advice; and how to apply legal and ethical responsibilities within professional and ministry contexts (involves workplace learning and an intensive school).

MIN400 Reflective Practice in Contemporary Ministry

This subject provides an overview of the basic tools of theological reflection and their application to reflective practice, forming the foundation for critical inquiry into the practice of Christian ministry. Students will develop their skills in reflective practice through the exploration of issues associated with their ministry experience. Topics include critical investigations of particular approaches to identified pastoral issues undertaken to understand thoroughly the strengths and weaknesses of methodologies. Students will apply reflection in action cycles in their own fields of ministry and establish a personal template for their reflective practice in ministry.

MIN406 Group and Peer Supervision

This subject introduces students to the principles and practice of group and peer supervision, which complement individual professional and pastoral supervision. Students will be helped to grow in the skills of facilitating group and peer supervision. Students will also learn how group and peer supervision can optimise reflective learning processes, provide supervisors with opportunities continuing professional development in their supervision practice, and enhance the importance of collaborative peer networks for advanced professional supervisors.

PROFESSIONAL RECOGNITION

Our course is recognised by the Australasian Association of Supervisors (AAOS).

PRACTICAL EXPERIENCE

This graduate certificate emphasises face-to-face practical sessions for role play and simulated supervision experiences. This course includes emphasis on group sharing and discussion as a form of assessment. It also requires learners to contract with a supervisee for six sessions of supervision.

CAREER OPPORTUNITIES

Completion of this award will position clergy and those in the helping/caring professions to offer professional supervision to clergy and other helpers. (National standards around clergy supervision are likely to emerge after the recent Royal Commission into churches and other institutions).

(with specialisation)

The Master of Pastoral Counselling aims to qualify individuals from a variety of backgrounds in pastoral counselling, including churches, universities, schools, military service, corrective services, police, aged care facilities, and the general community.

Students will learn to apply advanced knowledge and skills (including knowledge of research principles and methods applicable to the field) in a range of professional pastoral counselling contexts, enabling them to develop a mastery of the field in their professional practice. The program integrates applied pastoral theology with advanced pastoral counselling theory and skills through in-depth understanding of the discipline. This course is done through either clinical coursework or pastoral counselling research, and serves as a pathway to further learning.

ADMISSION

Applicants should:

- be able to demonstrate personal suitability to undertake professional practice as a pastoral counsellor, including self-awareness, relational capacity, personal ethical practice, being able to reflect on and learn from experience, and being open to positive and challenging feedback; and
- hold an undergraduate degree in theology, psychology or equivalent
- applicants with degrees in other disciplines are encouraged to apply; or
- have successfully completed the Graduate Diploma of Pastoral Counselling at CSU; or
- hold a Graduate Diploma of Counselling from another institution; if so they may be required to complete the Applied Pastoral Theology subject before being granted admission to the Master of Pastoral Counselling.
